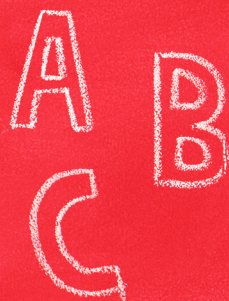


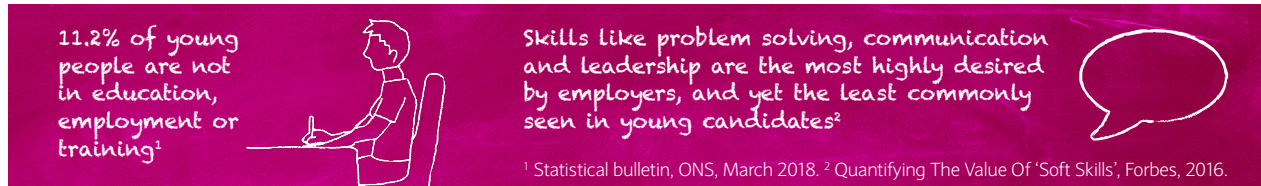
LifeSkills overview for educators



Why are employability skills so important?

LifeSkills helps address the skills gap and youth unemployment challenge, so young people leave education with the skills that businesses need.

As technology increasingly shapes the world of work, more importance is being placed on skills like problem solving and resilience to succeed in this changing environment. Through LifeSkills we want to support educators to prepare 11-24 year olds to move forward in the 21st century workplace.

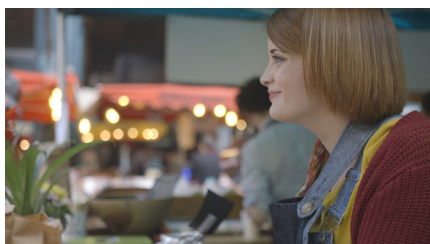

- 96% of teachers rated LifeSkills resources as good or very good³

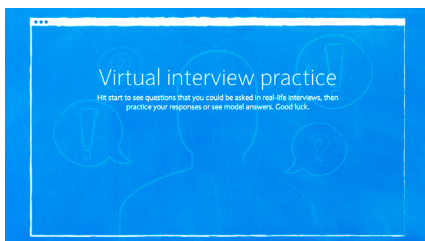

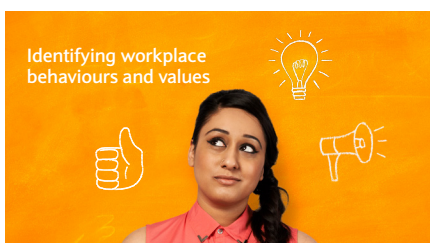
Show a film

Navigating LifeSkills

Lesson plans can be accessed via the LifeSkills homepage, with an option to browse all lessons, filter by category, or view content tagged by a particular theme. Filtering by category offers educators a logical journey through the content, and can be further refined by specifying age range and suitability for students with SEND.

The LifeSkills Content Guide makes embedding employability across your curriculum easy, by mapping all our content to curriculums for England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland for students aged 11-19.

Work experience

1. Work experience placements: barclayslifeskills.com/teachers/work-experience

Educators can reserve work experience placements for students aged 14-19 at different UK businesses. To ensure students maximise their placement, educators need to have delivered any combination of LifeSkills resources, e.g. lessons/volunteer-led lessons or homework tasks. Students can also work through content independently on the LifeSkills website, collecting points as they go. Once they earn 250+ points they can link back in with their teacher to co-ordinate their placement.

For educators facing time pressures in securing traditional placements, students can get a taste of working life without leaving the classroom with the Virtual Work Experience tool. They will take a virtual journey into the world of work to gain an understanding of how a business works, helping them with the real-world application of skills like communication, resilience and proactivity.
